In addition to acting, he also directed many episodes of *Dragnet* and other TV series.

David Harris - 5

Bette Davis 1908-1989 - Sultry-eyed actress who many remember for her role in *All About Eve* in 1950. Her performance in the 1935 film *Of Human Bondage* earned her a great deal of critical acclaim. **Before Fame:** She studied dance at the John Murray Anderson School of Theatre. **Trivia:** She founded her own production company, BD Productions, and starred in its first film, *A Stolen Life*.



John Brennan & Josephine Schmotz - 12



Shannen Doherty 1971 - Actress who won a 1993 Young Artist Award for her role as Brenda Walsh in *Beverly Hills, 90210*. She was nominated for Saturn Awards for her portrayal of Prue in *Charmed* in 1999 and 2000. **Before Fame:** She won guest roles on shows such as *Voyagers!* and *Father Murphy.* **Trivia:** Her rise to fame began at age 11 when she was cast for the role of Jenny Wilder on *Little House on the Prairie*.

Ken Lord - 17

Sean Bean 1959 - Known for playing Ned Stark in the television series *Game of Thrones* and Boromir in the *Lord of the Rings* trilogy. He also played the villain Alec Trevelyan in the 1995 James Bond film *GoldenEye*. His other film credits include *The Martian, Troy, National Treasure* and *Percy Jackson & the Olympians: The Lightning Thief.* **Before Fame:** He had a desire to become a soccer star but an accident with a glass door prevented him from pursuing it. **Trivia:** He is an acclaimed stage actor and appeared in many plays with the Royal Shakespeare Company.



Errol Gray - 20



Ryan O'Neal 1941-2023 - Starred with his daughter, Tatum O'Neal, in the popular show *Paper Moon*. He has played the recurring character Max Keenan in the TV show *Bones*. He has amassed over 60 on-screen roles throughout his acting career. **Before Fame:** In high school, he trained to become a Golden Glove boxer. **Trivia:** He was in soap opera *Peyton Place* and Stanley Kubrick's Barry Lyndon. He played Ryan in Terrence Malick's 2015 film *Knight of Cups*.

Simon Schmotz - 24

Kelly Clarkson 1982 - Pop singer who gained recognition for winning the first American Idol competition in 2002. Her debut single "A Moment Like This" became the song of the year, as well. In 2018, she became the judge on The Voice **Before Fame:** She turned down two full-ride scholarships to the University of Texas and the Berklee College of Music, and later turned down two record deals before winning American Idol. **Trivia:** In 2006, she won a Grammy Award for Best Female Pop Vocal Performance for the hit song "Since U Been Gone." She went on to rank on VH1's list of 100 Greatest Women in Music.



Sean Brooks & Ken Heylbut - 25



Al Pacino 1940 - Had his breakthrough as mobster Michael Corleone in *The Godfather* trilogy and won an Academy Award for Best Actor for his role as Frank Slade in the 1992 film *Scent of a Woman*. He is also known for his starring roles in *Dog Day Afternoon, Heat, Scarface* and *Serpico*. **Before Fame:** He developed a love for acting at an early age and participated in the majority of his school's productions. As a teenager, he went by the nickname Sunny and developed a reputation as a troublemaker at school. **Trivia:** He earned Tony Awards for his roles in the plays *Does*

a Tiger Wear a Necktie? in 1969 and The Basic Training of Pavlo Hummel in 1977.

Mervyn Benoit & Dave Targett - 28

Jay Leno 1950 - Born James Douglas Muir Leno, this stand-up comedian hosted *The Tonight Show* from 1992 to 2014 and gained additional fame for his exquisite car collection. **Before Fame:** He graduated from Emerson College with a speech therapy degree and founded his own comedy club. **Trivia:** He provided the voice of Vorb in the 1993 animated film *We're Back! A Dinosaur's Story* and Fast Tony in *Ice Age: The Meltdown*.



Alf Hill & John Wood - 29



Jerry Seinfeld 1954 - Stand-up comedian, producer, actor, and writer who co-created and starred in the sitcom *Seinfeld*, which became one of the most popular television comedies of all time. In 2012, he began the internet comedy series *Comedians in Cars Getting Coffee*, where he chats with other comedians. **Before Fame:** He tried out at an open-mic night at New York City's Catch a Rising Star after graduating from college. In 1979, he played Frankie, a mailman with obnoxious comedy routines, on the sitcom *Benson* until his director fired him. **Trivia:** In the 1990s, he had to rent a hangar at Santa Monica Airport to store his vehicle collection, which

included 46 Porsches.

Victoria Cross Awards:

2 Apr 1917 - Private Jørgen Christian Jensen, 50th Battalion, AIF.

8 Apr 1917 - Captain James Ernest Newland, 12th Battalion, AIF.

8 Apr 1917 - Sergeant John Woods Whittle, 2nd Battalion, AIF.

9 Apr 1917 - Private Thomas James Bede Kenny, 2nd Battalion, AIF.

15 Apr 1917 - Lieutenant Charles Pope, 11th Battalion, AIF.

7 Apr 1918 - Lieutenant Percy Valentine Storkey, 19th Battalion, AIF.

24-25 Apr 1918 - Lieutenant Clifford William King Sadlier, 51st Battalion, AIF.

13 Apr 1941 - Corporal John Hurst 'Jack' Edmondson, 2/17th Battalion, AIF.

7 Apr 1967 - Major Peter John Badcoe, Australian Army Training Team Vietnam.

This Month in History:

6 Apr 1942 - US 41st Division arrives in Australia. Between Dec 1941 and Aug1945 some one million Americans were stationed in Australia. Yankee go Home!!!

8 Apr 1918 - Repatriation Department established. Once soldiers were demobilised all tasks aimed at their rehabilitation and return to civilian life became the responsibility of the Repatriation Department.



9 Apr 1968 - HMAS *Sydney* arrived at Vung Tau. The 1st Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, disembarked and the 7th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, embarked. *Sydney* made 24 such voyages to Vietnam during the war.

13 Apr 1916 - Jifjaffa. A squadron of the 9th Light Horse Regiment captured this Turkish outpost in the Sinai, about 60 kilometres from the Suez. The encounter, the first engagement for the Light Horse in the Sinai, demonstrated their potential for fighting

in the Middle East.

13 Apr 1983 - Dedication of the Rats of Tobruk memorial. The memorial, on ANZAC Parade, was dedicated by the Governor-General of Australia, the Right Hon Sir Ninian Stephen. The memorial commemorates the Australian and Allied servicemen who died during the siege of Tobruk in 1941.

22 Apr 1941 - Evacuation of Greece begins. The evacuation marked the end of the ill-conceived Greek campaign which lasted only three weeks.



23 Apr 1918 - Ostend and Zeebruge, Belgium, raided. Eleven volunteers from HMAS *Australia* took part in a raid that aimed to prevent the Germans using these Belgian ports as a bases for their submarines.

25 Apr 1915 - Landings at Gallipoli. British, French, Australian and New Zealand troops were involved in a series of coordinated landings. Although the Gallipoli campaign was a military failure, the anniversary of the landing has become a national day of commemoration in Australia and New Zealand, and many other

countries around the globe.

28 Apr 1952 - Australia ratifies peace treaty with Japan and official ending of the British Commonwealth Occupation Force (BCOF). From the end of 1948 Australia had taken on the largest role in BCOF. When the state of occupation ended the Commonwealth organisation in Japan was redesignated British Commonwealth Forces Korea and continued supplying and administering Commonwealth forces then fighting in Korea.



Fun April Days:



4th is **Tell a Lie Day**. While the name suggests that the holiday encourages people to tell lies all day long, we would like to think that the day is not an actual celebration of lying but an acknowledgment that lying is part of life, and sometimes people have to lie to make others feel better. Such lies are called white lies and are possibly the only form of lying acceptable within most religions, cultures, and societies.

Other acceptable forms of lying include: lying while playing a game (bluffing), lies made for the purposes of amusement of the liar or other people (jocose lies), and untruthful statements made without any malicious intent (honest lie).

Did You Know...that a true or false response to the question *this statement is not true* leads to a contradiction called the Liar's Paradox? If the response to this statement is that it is true, then the statement is false, and if the response to the statement is that it is false, then the statement is true.

10th is **Siblings Day** - All of us who have been lucky enough to have siblings know that sometimes they can be annoying and a pain to be around, but this should not stop you from celebrating what will possibly be the longest relationship in your life.

The unofficial day was created by New Yorker Claudia Evart in memory of her brother and sister, whom she lost early in her life.

Since 1998, US President Bill Clinton and governors of 39 states in the U.S. have officially recognized Siblings Day as an observance.



Did You Know...that siblings who have the same parents share 50% of their DNA, while half-siblings – siblings who have one common parent – possess about 25% similar genetic material?



12th is **Grilled Cheese Day** - Enjoyed today by people around the world as an after school or as a comfort meal, the modern version of a grilled cheese is believed to have originated in the United States during the 1920s when sliced bread and cheese became easily available.


The cheese usually used in grilled cheese is American cheese which is a processed cheese product that has a very low melting point. Hot tomato soup, potato chips, and pickles are common accompaniments of a grilled cheese sandwich.

The British version of a grilled cheese is called a cheese toastie. The cheese of choice for a toastie is cheddar cheese.

Did You Know...that mozzarella is the most consumed cheese in the world?

25th is **DNA Day** - Double Helix April 25 was chosen as the day to acknowledge the contribution of genetics because on this day in 1953, scientists James Watson, Francis Crick, and their colleagues published the double helix structure of DNA in the journal, *Nature*.

Did You Know...that each human cell contains approximately 6.5 feet (2 meters) of DNA?

1 Apr 1955 - The Far East Strategic Reserve (FESR) begins in response to communist aggression in South East Asia following World War II.

2 Apr 2005 - A Royal Australian Navy Westland Sea King helicopter crashes on the Indonesian island of Nias while providing humanitarian support.

4 Apr 1923 - The *Country Women's Association* (CWA) holds its first annual conference, with a scone cookoff! *More recently I enjoyed some of their wares at the Royal Easter Show!!



8 Apr 1933 - A secession referendum in Western Australia passes, with 68 per cent voting in favour of secession from the Commonwealth.

14 Apr 1870 - Gold is discovered in Gulgong, New South Wales, sparking a major gold rush in the area.

16 Apr 2003 - The Australian Army's Special Operations Command begins a four-day chase of the North Korean ocean freighter *Pong Su* off the coast of Lorne, Victoria.



19 Apr 1770 - Leut James Cook and the crew of HMS *Endeavour* first sight the Eastern coast of Australia.

25 Apr 1927 - ANZAC Day is uniformly observed in all Australian states for the first time.

28 Apr 1949 - At the 43rd session of the International Olympic Committee, held in Rome, Italy, Melbourne is announced as the host of the 1956 Summer Olympics, defeating bids from Buenos Aires, Los Angeles, and Detroit.

29 Apr 1770 - Leut James Cook arrives and names Botany Bay, aboard HM Bark Endeavour.

29 Apr 1952 - The ANZUS Treaty, a military alliance between Australia, New Zealand, and the United States, comes into force.

30 Apr 1988 - World Expo 88, part of the Australian Bicentenary, opens in Brisbane.


