Anne Baxter 1923-1985 - Prominent actress who appeared in the 1942 film *The Magnificent Ambersons* and the 1956 film *The Ten Commandments*. She also played a role in the 1946 film *The Razor's Edge*. **Before Fame:** She began working at age 16 when she tried out for the role of Mrs. DeWinter in *Rebecca* and signed a contract with 20<sup>th</sup> Century Fox.

He played the piano at bars to help support his mother while in high school. **Trivia:** From 1973 to 2013, he wrote 33 top forty hits, including "*Just the Way You Are*" which hit #3 in 1977.

#### John Hughes - 14

Ada Nicodemou 1977 - Three time Logie Gold Award nominee who is known for her role as Leah Patterson-Baker on *Home and Away*. Her first TV credits came on the show *Police Rescue* in 1995 as the character Anastasia Skouras. **Before Fame:** Growing up, she attended the Johnny Young Talent School in Australia, where she learned to sing, dance and act. She made her acting debut with a recurring role on *Heartbreak High* in 1994. **Trivia:** She became the host of the series *Please Marry My Boy* in 2012. In 2005, she competed on and won the 3<sup>rd</sup> season of *Dancing with the Stars* with partner Aric Yegudkin.





#### Chris Salakas and Peter Darling - 15

James Mason 1909-1984 - He played Captain Nemo in Disney's 20,000 Leagues Under the Sea. His other films include The Verdict, A Star is Born, Julius Caesar, Lolita, and North by Northwest. Before Fame: He gained a degree in architecture in college and began acting in stock theater companies for fun. Trivia: He refused to participate in fighting during WWII

#### Brian Ward - 18

Miriam Margolyes 1941 - Award-winning actress who became known for role in the 1993 film *The Age of Innocence* and played Professor Sprout in the *Harry Potter* film franchise. **Before Fame:** Before gaining recognition, she worked as a voice over actor for Japanese television shows. **Trivia:** She provided the voice for Aunt Sponge in the 1996 film *James And The Giant Peach*.

# Victoria Cross Awards for May:

6 May 1917 - Corporal G.J. Howell, 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion originally of Enfield, NSW, performs the action for which he was awarded the Victoria Cross in fighting near Bullecourt.

6 & 11 May 1969 - Warrant Officer Class 2 R.S. Simpson, Australian Army Training Team Vietnam, originally from Chippendale, NSW, performs the action for which he was awarded the Victoria Cross in fighting in Kontum Province, South Vietnam.

12 May 1917 - Lieutenant R.V. Moon, 58<sup>th</sup> Battalion, of Bacchus Marsh, Victoria, performs the action for which he was awarded the Victoria Cross in fighting at Bullecourt.

12 May 1945 - Corporal J.B. Mackey, 2/3<sup>rd</sup> Pioneer Battalion, originally from Leichhardt, Sydney, performs the action for which he was awarded Victoria Cross in fighting on Tarakan. It was a posthumous award.

15 May 1945 - Private E. Kenna, 2/4<sup>th</sup> Battalion, originally from Hamilton, Victoria, performs the action for which he was awarded the Victoria Cross in fighting near Wewak, New Guinea.

16 May 1901 - Lieutenant F.W. Bell, 6<sup>th</sup> West Australian Mounted Infantry, of Perth, Western Australia, performs the action for which he was awarded the Victoria Cross in fighting at Brakpan, South Africa.

19 May 1918 - Sergeant W. Ruthven, 22<sup>nd</sup> Battalion, originally from Collingwood, Victoria, performs the action for which he was awarded the Victoria Cross in fighting at Ville-sur-Ancre, France.



19-20 May 1915 - Lance Corporal A. Jacka, 14<sup>th</sup> Battalion, originally of Winchelsea, Victoria, performs the action for which he was awarded the Victoria Cross in fighting at Courtney's Post, Gallipoli. Jacka's was the first VC to be awarded to an Australian in WWI. He also went on to win the Military Cross and Bar.

24 May 1969 - Warrant Officer Class 2 K. Payne, Australian Army Training Team Vietnam, originally from Ingham, Queensland, performs the action for which he was awarded the Victoria Cross in fighting in Kontum Province.

The Victoria Cross is the highest award for acts of bravery in wartime. It was instituted in 1856 by Queen Victoria and made retrospective to 1854 to cover the period of the Crimean War. It is possible for any serving member of the armed forces to obtain this award.

The Victoria Cross was designed, according to the original warrant for the award, to be in the form of the "Maltese Cross". Its shape, however, more closely resembles a cross pattée. In the centre of the medal is a lion guardant standing upon the Royal Crown. The words "For valour" are inscribed below. The Victoria Cross is suspended from a crimson ribbon. On the reverse of the cross the date of the act of bravery is inscribed, along with the name, rank, and unit of the recipient.

The Victoria Cross for Australia is identical to the original design. It is a "cross pattée 41mm high, 36mm wide. The arms of the Cross have raised edges. The obverse bears a Crowned Lion standing on the Royal Crown with the words 'FOR VALOUR' inscribed on a semi-circular scroll below the Crown. The reverse bears raised edges on the arms of the cross and the date of the act for which the Cross is awarded is engraved within the circle in the centre. The inscription was originally to have been 'FOR BRAVERY', until it was changed on the recommendation of Queen Victoria, who thought some might erroneously




consider that only the recipients of the Victoria Cross were brave in battle. The decoration, suspension bar, and link weigh about 27gms (0.87 troy ounces).

The cross is suspended by a ring from a serifed "V" to a bar ornamented with laurel leaves, through which the ribbon passes. The reverse of the suspension bar is engraved with the recipient's name, rank, number and unit. On the reverse of the medal is a circular panel, on which the date of the act for which it was awarded is engraved in the centre. The ribbon is crimson and is 38mm (1.5") wide. Although the warrants state the colour as red, it is defined by most commentators as "crimson" or "wine-red".

# This Month in History (Repeated):

3 May 1917 - Second battle of Bullecourt begins. Operations against the Hindenburg line at Bullecourt were aimed at protecting the British flank during operations at Arras. After a disastrous first attempt on 11 Apr, a second involving the 2<sup>nd</sup> Australian Division was made. That attack succeeded, but fighting continued over the following two weeks, drawing in troops from the 1<sup>st</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> Australian Divisions. Bullecourt was finally captured at a cost of about 7,000 British and Australian casualties.

5 May 1915 - Australians and New Zealanders on Cape Helles. The 2<sup>nd</sup> Australian Brigade and the New Zealand Brigade were redeployed from Anzac Cove to Cape Helles to assist British and French troops in their attempts to capture the dominating heights known as Achi Baba.



11 May 1945 - Wewak was captured by the 6th Division in a combined land and amphibious operation. Its fall marked the beginning of the end of the Aitape-Wewak campaign, the last major campaign on mainland New Guinea in the Second World War.

14 May 1943 - The hospital ship Centaur was sunk

by a Japanese submarine off the south Queensland coast. Only 64 of the 333 on board survived.

20 May 1941 - German airborne forces begin their invasion of Crete on 20 May. Though outnumbered by Allied troops, they were better equipped and better organised. After less than two weeks of fighting allied troops began to evacuate the island.

22 May 1940 - Decision to form 8<sup>th</sup> Division made. Most of the 8<sup>th</sup> Division was lost in the fall of Singapore in Feb 1942. The Division never took the field as a complete Division because the battalions of the 23<sup>rd</sup> Brigade were sent to Ambon, Timor and Rabaul.

> 24 May 1966 - Private Errol Noack killed in Vietnam. Private Noack, 5th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, was the first Australian national serviceman to be killed in the Vietnam War.

28 May 1968 - D company, 6th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, receives citation. Award of United States Presidential Unit Citation to D Company, 6<sup>th</sup> Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, for the Battle of Long Tan.

31 May 1942 - Of the three Japanese submarines that attacked Sydney Harbour, two were destroyed or disabled during the raid; the third disappeared and was located off Sydney's northern beaches by a group of amateur divers in Nov 2006. Little material damage was caused by the attack, but 21 sailors were killed when the depot ship HMAS Kuttabul was torpedoed.

5 May 1998 - Four Royal Australian Navy sailors die from carbon monoxide poisoning after a fire aboard HMAS Westralia.

9 May 1901 - The first Parliament of Australia opened in the Royal Exhibition Building in Melbourne.

9 May 1927- The federal government moved to Canberra from Melbourne with the opening of the Provisional Parliament House.

13 May 2012 - A resident of Old South Head Road, Sydney, Don Ritchie, who successfully intervened in at least 160 suicide attempts at The Gap, dies aged 86.

17 May 1928 - The Royal Flying Doctor Service of Australia makes its first official flight from Cloncurry to Julia Creek.

19 May 1942 - The prototype CAC Boomerang, an Australian designed and built fighter aircraft, takes to the air for the first time. The Boomerang was rapidly designed as to meet the urgent demands for fighter aircraft to equip the Royal Australian Air Force (RAAF). It was the first combat aircraft designed and constructed in Australia.


