Gwyn McMillan - 8

James Van Der Beek 1977 - Actor known best for his breakout role as Dawson Leery on TV's Dawson's Creek. He later played himself on the short-lived ABC series Don't Trust the B---- in Apartment 23. In 2018, he began starring on FX's Pose. **Before**Fame: He was a member of an all-male acappella group in high school and at age 15 he wanted to try professional acting, so he asked his mother to take him to Las Vegas

to get an agent. **Trivia:** He portrayed Kesha's enemy in her music video for the song "Blow" in 2011.



David Munckton - 13



Paul Fix 1901-1983 - Remembered for his work in Western movies and television series, he is perhaps most well known for his portrayal of Marshal Micah Torrance on the ABC series The Rifleman. His other credits include the TV series The Virginian, Gunsmoke, and Wagon Train and the films Ride Beyond Vengeance, Young Billy Young and Wanda Nevada. **Before**Fame: After serving in the United States Army during the World War I years, he made his first credited cinematic appearance in the 1926 feature Hoodoo Ranch. **Trivia:** He played the judge in the classic 1962 film To Kill a Mockingbird.

Graham 'Toby' Cook - 16

Victor Jack Maddern 1928-1993 - English actor who is best known for his roles in Chitty Chitty Bang Bang, Four Desperate Men and Exodus. **Before Fame:** He attended Beal Grammar Boys school. After graduating he joined the Merchant Navy at 15 and served in the Second World War till he was medically discharged in 1946. He was trained at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art. **Trivia:** He ran a script printing business, and in 1991 opened a public speaking school.

Kerry Hutchison - 29



Brendan Gleeson 1955 - Dublin-born actor who is perhaps best known for his role as Professor Alastor 'Mad Eye' Moody in the Harry Potter films. His other famous films include Gangs of New York, In Bruges, Mission: Impossible 2, Troy, and 28 Days Later. **Before Fame:** He worked as a teacher in Dublin, Ireland. He debuted in Dear Sarah as Brendan Dowd. **Trivia:** He made his movie debut in Mel Gibson's Braveheart, which was about Scotland's war for independence. Brendan Gleeson to play Donald Trump in TV series based on 'tell-all' book by ex-FBI director.

Troy Klinar - 31

Brooke Shields 1965 - Actress who starred in the films Blue Lagoon and Endless Love in the early 1980s. Her television credits include Law & Order: Special Victims Unit, That '70s Show and Lipstick Jungle. **Before Fame:** She began modelling when she was eleven months old. **Trivia:** She starred as the title character on the sitcom Suddenly Susan from 1996 to 2000.

This Month in History:

1 Mar 1942 - HMAS *Perth* sunk in Sunda Strait. Having survived the battle of the Java Sea HMAS *Perth* and the United States Cruiser *Houston* were sunk in a battle against overwhelming Japanese forces off the western tip of Java. 353 of Perth's 680 crew were killed in the battle., with 109 more dying in prison camps.

13 Mar 1943 - Japanese reconnaissance flight over Darwin. In addition to the 64 air raids on Darwin the Japanese made numerous reconnaissance flights over northern Australia.

15 Mar 1944 - First two women from the Voluntary Aid Detachments organisation enlist in the AIF. Most Voluntary Aids transferred after August 1942 into the new Australian Army Women's Medical Service. Over 200 Voluntary Aids served in the Middle East and Ceylon during the Second World War.



17 Mar 1942 - General MacArthur flies to Darwin. Having left the Philippines after the Japanese invasion, General MacArthur was appointed to command the newly created Southwest Pacific Area. Australia became the base from which he would launch offensive action against the Japanese in the Pacific, and makes his "I shall return" speech at Terowie, South Australia, on 20 Mar.

20 Mar 1916 - ANZAC Corps land in France. With Gallipoli behind them the bulk of Australia's forces were now sent to France where the terrible fighting on the Western Front awaited.

21 Mar 1918 - Final German offensive of the First World War begins. The Germans hoped to split the Allied forces around Amiens and drive towards the English Channel. After initial success their advance slowed and was turned into the retreat that eventually led to the end of the First World War.




21 Mar 1942 - Air battle for Port Moresby begins. The Japanese had hoped to occupy Port Moresby as a base from which to cut off shipping to Eastern Australia. Their defeat in the Battle of the Coral Sea thwarted the planned naval attack and invasion against Port Moresby.

22 Mar 1942 - Japanese aircraft bomb Katherine, this was the only air raid against Katherine, one man was killed.

31 Mar 1921 - At the beginning of World War I, there was no Australian air force or similar body. Flying was in its infancy, and aircraft had never been used in battle. The Australian Flying Corps was established during World War I, as a corps in the army (the Australian Imperial Force or AIF). Its squadrons served under the British Royal Flying Corps. In Australia negotiations between Army, Navy and Defence officials from 1917 to 1921 resulted in the Australian Air Force being formed on 31 Mar 1921, with approval to use the 'Royal' prefix granted on 13 Aug 1921.

Fun Days:

5th is **March Forth and Do Something Day**. The name of this unofficial holiday plays on the words, march fourth, which when spoken out loud sounds like march forth - an expression used to convey action and moving forward.

Homonyms - March fourth and march forth are homophones words or expressions that are pronounced alike but have different meanings. Homographs, on the other hand, are words or expressions that are spelled the same way but have different



meanings. Examples of such words include bass (a deep sound and a type of fish) and bow (to bend, the front of a ship and a type of knot). Homophones and homographs are both types of homonyms. **Did You Know**...that 'Pass the Word'

the word March is a capitonym? Capitonyms are words or expressions whose meaning changes depending on whether it's capitalized or not. March refers to the month, while march refers to walking in a measured way.



17th is **Submarine Day** - It is thought that the unofficial holiday commemorates the date in 1898 when Irish engineer John Philip Holland showed his submarine design to the U.S. Navy.

Modern Submarine

Called the Holland Type VI submarine, his prototype was the first modern submarine design to work successfully underwater. His submarines became the first vessels to be bought by the United States Navy and the British Royal Navy.

A similar holiday is celebrated on April 11 in the US as a way to honour the anniversary of the establishment of the U.S. Submarine Force in 1900.

Military Purposes

Submarines have primarily been used for offensive military purposes throughout the 20th century. During World War I and World War II, they were used to sink enemy ships. In the present day, while submarines are still used by the military, they are increasingly being used for civilian benefits. Their ability to go deep underwater have made it possible for scientists to research marine life and the seabed. They are also sometimes used for underwater tourism.



Most present-day military submarines run using nuclear power, though, in many parts of the world, diesel-electric submarines are also in common use.

Submarine the Sandwich

In many parts of the United States, a submarine is a type of sandwich. Usually made with a long roll of bread and filled with meats, vegetables, and spreads, this popular lunch dish is also called by other names like hero, hoagie, grinder, and sub. It is thought that the sandwich was named submarine because it resembles the shape of the underwater vessel.

How to Celebrate?

- Watch movies that feature submarines, like 'Das Boot'!

The name *March* is ultimately derived from the Latin word *Martius* (named after *Mars*, the Roman god of war). *Martius* was the name of the first month in the original Roman calendar. Along with *January*, *May*, and *June*, *March* is one of several months named after a god.

1 Mar 1919 - The Potts cartoon strip is first published.

19 Mar 1790 - The HMS *Sirius*, while transporting supplies to Norfolk Island, is wrecked and destroyed on a reef.





28 Mar 1885 - HMQS Gayundah arrives in Brisbane. The Captain refuses to relinquish his command and is removed by a boarding party of Queensland Police.
